1. Arkwright. **BROWNE Michael**
Arkwright, Industry & Architecture: A Study of the effects of the early Industrial Revolution on Architecture, with particular reference to the buildings erected by Sir Richard Arkwright, the cotton industrialist.

Study of Arkwright's activities at Cromford, Matlock etc, including a good deal on his ideal housing projects. These were some of the first industrial model schemes in Britain.

Oldknow and Arkwright were in partnership in the cotton industry. Their technically innovative new factories at Mellor and Marple, utilizing water power, also included adjoining model communities for the workers. The latter are described here in detail. The atmosphere was essentially a kind of 'benevolent despotism', however.

3. **BEASTALL T W A North Country Estate. The Lumleys and Saundersons as landowners, 1600-1900.**

This linked Estate had large properties in Durham, Yorkshire and Lincolnshire. These included agricultural and colliery estate villages and the planned sea-bathing resort at Skegness.

"A magnificent book"-W.G.Hoskins. This very detailed work shows that planned towns were much more widespread in England in this period than was previously thought.

Coalbrookdale and Ironbridge settlements were a cradle of the Industrial Revolution in Britain. This work gives a detailed account of the buildings, and has excellent plans and photos of the model housing.

Edinburgh was one of the very few British cities to have a new town added to its existing settlement. The author is good at invoking the character of this ambitious development.

The best book on this key town planning episode. An entire new settlement was built to the north of the medieval Old Town. Perhaps only Newcastle (see entries below) achieved such a comprehensive new ideal plan in this period.

Frome was one of the earliest planned industrial urban developments in Britain, with beginnings in the late 17th century. The Quaker shoe company, Clarke's, were pioneers of workers' housing in the town.

12. **FUSSELL G E** *The English Rural Labourer. His Home, Furniture, Clothing & Food from Tudor to Victorian Times*

A detailed account of the domestic life of the rural cottager during four centuries. There is a good deal on life in estate cottages. The nooks and crannies of the 'picturesque' style cottages built in some model estate villages made them difficult to live in. They were designed for show, not for the comfort of the cottagers.

It was planned out as a series of model estates by George Gutch etc in the first decades of the 19th century. The last article considers present day restoration problems in the area. Well illustrated and interesting articles, making a nice 4to pamphlet.

Very useful composite volume of these key works. More's, Bacon's and Harrington's texts were all influential for later British thinking on practical ideal settlements.

Detailed informative catalogue on this famous architect/planner, for an exhibition at Newcastle's Laing Art Gallery. Dobson was the main architect of the rebuilding of the city centre in the classical style.

Good source for the English Cistercian communities of the early middle ages. Their settlement forms were influential in some 19th century model layouts eg in plans of almshouses; and the religious collegiate idea has also had a lasting influence.

Excellent visual source on Oglethorpe's planned town, founded 1734-6. Savannah, with its unrivalled series of squares, had considerable influence on early 19th century model community ideas in Britain. For instance J. S. Buckingham visited it and utilized its basic layout pattern in his "Victoria" scheme (see next section).

Detailed life of Bellamy, whose utopian novel 'Looking Backward' (1888), strongly influenced Morris and Howard

Bray was an early 19th century American socialist, who lived for a long time in England. His writings were praised by Marx. "A Voyage from Utopia", written about 1840, wasn't re-discovered until 1937 and is published here for the first time. Bray paints a dystopian picture of the world beyond a fair socialist society.

The first trade edition of Morris' famous utopian novel. This work was written partly as a reaction to Bellamy's "Looking Backward" (see above), whose ideas Morris disliked. Ebenezer Howard was impressed by the anti-urban sentiments expressed in "News from Nowhere" and incorporated some of them into his "Tomorrow".
